JULY IN BIBLICAL TIMES

In the Hebrew calendar, the month of Tamuz (Hebrew: দাসনু, Tammūz) is 29 days long and occurs in the tenth month of the civil year and the fourth month of the ecclesiastical year. This coincides with the Gregorian calendar around June–July.

According to Jewish history, on Tamuz 3, 1273 BC, the army of Israel under the leadership of Joshua was fighting against the Amorites. Joshua prayed and the Lord caused the sun to stand still until Joshua and the army of Israel defeated the Amorites.

On Tamuz 29, 64/65, the Apostle Paul was beheaded in Rome. Paul knew he was going to die: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day.

INDEPENDENCE DAY

On July 1, 1776, representatives from the thirteen colonies gathered in the Continental Congress and adopted the Declaration of Independence. Recognizing the self-evident truths, the representatives wrote: all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness.

From this declaration, the colonists continued to fight for independence from Great Britain until they finally defeated them in 1783. Born over 100 years later, Elmer Davis (WWII Director of the U.S. Office of War Information) wrote: "This nation will remain the land of the free only so long as it is the home of the brave."

In Common

com·mon (kŏm'ən), adj.

- a. shared equally by two or more; joint; common interests.
- b. relating to the community as a whole.

Hierarchical Considerations

In school most of us learned history during "history class," and if fortunate, studied the Bible in "Bible class" or "Religion."

Compartmentalizing subjects often fails to meaningfully link the information we have learned across subjects. For example, most learned that a great fire ravaged Rome for six days. Some recall additional details, such as the estimate that 70% of the city was destroyed, leaving half the population homeless. Many have heard the expression "Nero fiddled while Rome burned."

Nero was Rome's emperor at the time Rome burned. He was a cruel and murderous tyrant. When the great fire broke out in 64AD, Nero was at his villa at Antium, 35 miles from Rome. He returned and began relief measures but people did not trust him - some believed he had ordered the fire started to rebuild Rome according to his preferences.

Two of the districts untouched by the fire were disproportionally populated by Christians, who were then an obscure religious sect, so Nero blamed them. As a leader of Rome's Christians, Paul was arrested and put in prison (typically a holding cell for those awaiting trial or execution, rather than incarceration as a form of punishment). Hence, history connects with the Word. During his second imprisonment, Paul had apparently received a preliminary hearing and was awaiting final trial, expecting to be found guilty. During this time, Paul prayed "At my first defense no one came to stand by me, but all deserted me; may it not be charged against them!" ~2 Timothy 4:16

FELLOWSHIP

Because we are a small and loving church, many would attest we know one another fairly well. We serve together, pray together, eat together, laugh together, and sometimes we cry together.

Remembering the importance of maintaining our relationships with each other and building our church family, this poll is dedicated to learning about one another.

Secular Similarities

According to the U.S. Department of Transportation's Bureau of Transportation Statistics, almost 9 out of 10 long-distance trips are taken by personal vehicle. The other 10 percent of trips use public transportation modes. Over 7 percent of long-distance trips are taken by air, while 2 percent are by bus. Train travel represents almost 1 percent of long-distance trips.

SSBC members likely mirror this data in practice; however, a personal vehicle is not the stated *preferred* mode of travel. Respondents to last month's survey voted for travel by train! Train travel is viewed as friendly, relaxing, old-school, and charming. Locally, we might visit the Grapevine Vintage Railroad, which is located in Historic Downtown Grapevine and uses authentic 1920s Victorian coaches to travel to the Ft. Worth Stockyards. Shared events keep us together!

Connecting the Pieces

Paul was killed in July of AD 64; Nero was emperor. Paul prayed for the forgiveness of his persecutors. Jesus taught us to forgive others both for failing to fulfill what God requires (debts) and for failing to do the right thing when acting (trespasses). Different denominations use these different terms when praying the Lord's Prayer, as did Luke and Matthew.

Why?

In Aramaic, Jesus could use the word *khoba*, which means both debts and sins. Greek expresses these two ideas with separate words. When the Lord's Prayer was translated into Greek, Matthew chose "debts" and Luke managed to use both words. Whichever word is chosen for worship in English, we should be mindful that we both covet and bestow forgiveness for debts as well as trespasses.
